Discovering a Young Studebaker Enthusiast



If you grew up in the late 50's and early 60's you would have been glued to the TV set every week to see what adventure Paladin, a gun slinger and gentleman for hire, would get up to.

Well, "Golden Era Automotive Adventures" aka Anthony Trujillo is similar. He might not be a gunslinger for hire, but he is a gentleman for hire. Not for gunslinging services but for various Studebaker activities.

I caught up with him in Missoula, Montana to see what he was all about as I found his web page on Facebook intriguing. ... He not only travelled throughout the U.S. fixing Studebakers, but he is a BIG anomaly in that he is young! The following describes what he is up to, what his plans are for the future, and most importantly, why.





My first question for Anthony was: "Do you know you are strange in that you're actively involved in Studebakering and you're under the age of 70?" (Not everybody gets my sense of humor, thankfully he did!).

After he had a good laugh, he replied, "Yeah, I know. It wasn't my original intention - I kind of

was back in that same town repairing x-ray equipment and he phoned Doug and asked if he needed anything (thinking that might be a run to the grocery store or whatever). The reply was: "Yes, can you help me polish my 64 Hawk?" That led to a relationship with Anthony catching a Greyhound back and forth to help him and a couple of his friends work on their cars.

lucked into it and love the cars, the people and what I do."

That comment led me down a rabbit hole of questions as to how, why, and where, so I'll summarize. Please keep in mind this isn't his complete story, just the points I remember.

As to how Anthony started down this path in life,

he told me that he started out working in a Studebaker junkyard after high school. That lasted a short period and then a few years later he was helping a friend transport a car to the old shop when he spotted a car he always wanted – a 1964 Wagonaire, a car he fantasized about nine times a day over several days. It eventually became his.

After this he ended up helping around the Studebaker shop again and tagged along one day as they drove hours away to deliver a reclining seat for a man, "Doug" who needed it due to a back injury.

One day at Anthony's first SDC zone meet he had an aha moment, looked around and realized "This is where I am supposed to be."

One call led to another and soon Anthony switched careers from being an X-Ray machine repair person to a travelling Studebaker repair guy. That was the re-birth of C&B Studebaker Parts, now Golden Era Automotive Parts and Mobil Service.

He transitioned from only repair, to helping people (and their surviving relatives) re-purpose their collections or than he would ever have time for in several lifetimes. He was mostly enthralled with Studebakers, but also wandered into Model T's, Austins, and Porsches, plus whatever else struck his fancy.

Anthony has made many connections and has been able to help the widow move a significant number of items around the world to people like you and me that need/want them. He still has a long, long way to go as you can see by some of the pictures.

When asked how long he plans to do this, he

Over the past few years Anthony has travelled throughout the U.S. helping people, working on their cars, delivering parts, attending



became somewhat emotional and replied, "I can see an end, but I will do this as long as there are cars to fix and collections to move on to others."

For a longtime Studebaker fanatic like me, it is so refreshing to meet not only someone young who is enthusiastic about all things

meets, and going wherever the Studebaker wind takes him.

Re-purposing Studebaker "stuff" is the reason he has been in Missoula off and on for the last couple of years. A gentleman recently passed away with a relatively massive collection of cars, projects and three large buildings full of parts.

A walk through those buildings with an eye to the archeology of the parts shows the gentleman would probably have bought a car or truck, then started amassing parts for the restoration of that vehicle. Unfortunately, he gathered more projects and parts Studebaker, but someone who is trying (and succeeding) to make a living out of it. I don't think Anthony will ever become a rich man doing this, but I don't think that is his goal. Be happy and be thankful you can follow your passion.

Notes from the Studebaker Nation

What's more sympatico than cars and music? The two go together like Sonny and Cher. One is just made better by the other. It's may be more

than pure coincidence that the first rock 'n' roll song was about an automobile.

Credited to Jackie Brenston and the Delta Cats, *Rocket 88* was recorded in Memphis in 1951.

Its rocking piano intro is courtesy of one Mr. Ike Turner. And the Delta Cats was, in fact, Turner's band Kings of Rhythm.

Hardly original, *Rocket 88*'s 12-bar blues was a hot-tempered model of an earlier song by Jimmy Liggins about another car. Liggins' *Cadillac Boogie* was released in 1948.

Stylistically, it's a boogie woogie, a prototype rocker but its spine is too stiff and the backbeat too tight.

In Ike Turner's hands, and with the expressive vocals of Jackie Brenston, who was the saxophone player in the Kings of Rhythm, *Rocket 88* steps on the gas and passes boogie woogie and nascent rhythm and blues on a wide curve and leaves them struggling up the hill.

And that's how rock 'n' roll was born. Full throttle.

When car culture and popular music collide, the wreckage is a beautiful amalgam of high-octane highway cruising, high voltage rhythm, and hard driving beats.

Automobile sound systems have advanced astronomically since that first day in 1930 when engineer Paul Galvin invented an affordable radio for the average driver.

Some sources say his radio was first installed in a Studebaker. Even if that's not true, let's just pretend it is.

Today's factory-installed sound systems are super beefy

with multiple speakers, subwoofers, and graphic equalizers. They're better than most people's home stereo systems.

In our custom classics, a modern sound system is a necessary investment.

While car radios have improved, so have songs about cars.

Rocket 88 wasn't the last rock song about a car, nor was it the best.

Everyone has their favorite. Mine is Bruce Springsteen's *Born to Run*, a classic slab of wax from 1975, the year of my high school

graduation. What a way to be sent down the road!

What makes this the essential song about cars is that it locates them in the center of human existence.

Cars take us from our dreary places we're trapped in, and deliver us in a brave new world of our own choosing.

Springsteen's anthem says take a chance, break away, get on down the road toward your destiny. Staying in your small town with your small-town dreams is a "death trap, suicide rap."

Baby, we gotta get on board. Born to Run is authentically American in its aspirations. The freedom the song expresses is the same freedom we seek behind the wheel of our automobiles.


It's optimistic in its vision, though the "highway is jammed with broken heroes on a lastchance power drive."

Wherever we're heading, we're going to get there in our cars and we'll be listening to the soundtrack that defines our lives.

McKeever's Tech Tips Troubleshooting the Headlight Circuit, Pt. 2

Before we continue with troubleshooting, here are some best practices for safety, and for refreshing your memory:

- Most headlights are nonfused; therefore, they will have some other kind of circuit protection. It could be in a variety of places, such as by, or in, the headlight switch or by the ignition switch, depending on the year and model of your vehicle.
- Any switch that works without the key being on is live (hot) so disconnect the battery before working on said switch. It is always best to disconnect the battery when preparing to test any electrical components.
- Reattach the battery to take voltage readings but make sure switches or exposed wires are not touching any metal.
- Voltage readings should match, or come close to matching, your battery's voltage.
- Ohm readings **MUST** always be done with the battery disconnected. Results should range from 0 to less than 0.5.
- Star washers are your friend when connecting ground wires.
- Always be on the lookout for corroded, dirty, broken, or loose, connections and wires, and fix or replace them.
- Many older cars have cloth wrapped wires that need to be inspected for fabric deterioration, resulting in exposed (bare) wire that could short out.
- If you have a vehicle with a positive ground, you need to reverse your meter leads for proper readings
- Keep your work area free of combustibles, as an electrical arc can ignite and cause a fire.



• Remember to remove all rings, watches, jewelry, etc. before working on your vehicle, as they can conduct electricity and/or can get caught on car parts, which can cause severe injury!

Note: In last month's article, a 12-volt reference was used when taking voltage readings. If you have a 6-volt system your reading needs to be at least 6 volts, and an 8-volt system needs to read at least 8 volts.

Here is a quick check troubleshooting guide for when you have partial headlights. **Refer to last month's article for checking voltage and ohm readings from input and output connections and wires.** For diagnostic purposes we will continue to use a sealed beam 2-light system. The same techniques work for a 4-light system.

One light completely out

If driver's side is on (low and high beams) but passenger side is out

- 1. Dimmer is good, do a voltage check on the passenger headlight plug to verify voltage and ground (Tap dimmer switch to make sure voltage checks have been done to both low and high circuits.)
- 2. If there is a good voltage reading on high and/or low outputs, ground wire is good. The headlight is bad, but any jumper wire that has a failed voltage needs to have an ohm check

performed on that circuit. Start by ohming the front and back of the plug. If bad, fix or replace the plug. If good, then ohm the wire. Fix and verify voltage at the output (front) side of plug, making sure it is good before installing the new headlight, or you will continue to have a beam out on the new headlight as well.

If driver's side is out but passenger side is on (low and high)

- Dimmer is good, do a voltage check on the driver's headlight plug to verify voltage and ground (Tap dimmer switch to make sure voltage checks have been done to both low and high circuits)
- 2. If there is a good voltage reading on high and/or low outputs, ground wire is good. The headlight is bad, but if you have a bad voltage reading on either the high or low outputs you could also have a bad headlight plug, Ohm the front and back of the plug to verify. Fix or replace the plug and make sure the voltage reading is good before installing the new headlight, or you will continue to have a beam out on the new headlight as well.

Only low beams out or only high beams out

- If only one light is out on either side, dimmer switch and ground are good. Do a voltage check on the affected beam on the headlight plug.
- If voltage reading is good, headlight is bad, replace.
- If voltage reading is bad, follow step 2 from **One light completely out** that matches the affected side
- If both low beams are out, or both high beams are out,
- Do a voltage check on driver's side headlight plug on the output (front) of the affected beam
- If voltage reading is bad, do a voltage check of the affected beam at the output of the dimmer switch. If voltage reading at dimmer is bad, replace dimmer.

- If voltage reading at dimmer is good, take an ohm reading of the wire from dimmer to the affected beam of driver's side headlight plug. Fix or replace if necessary. Do another voltage check to verify.
- If voltage reading is good and affected driver's beam is still out, headlight is bad, replace. Passenger beam should then come on.
- If voltage reading is still bad, driver's headlight plug could be bad. Ohm the headlight plug as outlined above in **One light completely out - Driver's side out** step 2 to verify. Fix or replace plug and make sure new voltage reading is good before installing the new headlight
- If affected passenger beam is still out, repeat the previous procedures on passenger side as necessary. (Roger's car really did have two bad headlights at the same time)

Next month we will go back to the dimmer switch for another scenario.

(Remember when taking ohm readings, you MUST disconnect the item to be ohm-ed from its power source. The safest thing to do is just disconnect your battery when ohm-ing.)

- Take ohm readings from the front of the ground terminal on the headlight plug to the eyelet, the front of terminal to back of terminal, and back of terminal to eyelet. An ohm reading of more than .5 anywhere tells you to look for broken wire, corrosion in the terminal, bad or broken crimps, etc. Fix and replace as necessary, re-ohm for continuity, and take another voltage reading in the high and low terminals. If good, try your headlights. If they don't come on you have a bad bulb.
- If either of the high or low terminal voltage checks are still bad, it's time to ohm the wires from the dimmer to the headlight plug, looking for broken wire, corrosion in the

terminals, bad or broken crimps, etc. Fix and replace as necessary, re-ohm for continuity and take another voltage reading in the high and low terminals. Voltage readings should now be good, and you will either have headlights or a bad bulb that needs replacing.

• Follow these same voltage checks and ohm procedures on the other headlight plug(s) as needed. Remember to check the jumper wires between headlights. (Some cars have 2 lights; some have 4 lights. On a 4 light system the other 2 lights are high beams and will only have two terminals, a ground and a high.)

Roger's coupe started and drove but had no headlights. It also didn't have a dimmer switch so, we had to unhook the battery and go to the headlight switch. Its output was at least 12 volts, so we went to the headlight plugs. They also read at least 12 volts which then told us BOTH headlights were bad at the same time, what are the odds! (Here's a curiosity, the coupe was wired with the low beams in the parking light position and the high beams in the headlight position! This works only because the coupe doesn't have parking lights, but it is not something I would recommend.)

Roger's Studebaker truck also started and drove but had no headlights. We split the circuit at the dimmer switch (Yay, he had one here!). It read at least 12 volts from the headlight switch to the dimmer but had a non-existent reading in the outputs to the headlights on both sides. We replaced the dimmer switch and had headlights again, no need to take the bulbs out to test them.

NOTE: Just like the adage, "measure twice, cut once," it is a good idea, before you spend money on a new part, to repeat your voltage checks enough times to verify your results are the same.

Every manufacturer has some variation of wiring styles. Your vehicle's switches and plugs may vary slightly from these diagrams, but the procedures are basically the same.
